The last will and testament of Elizabeth Walker widow  
of Col. John Walker deceased, made the sixth day of  
July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred &  
five. At this time I the said Elizabeth Walker being of sound  
and perfect memory & possessed of rational faculties  
and sound mind, yet withal in a feeble state of body  
and health much impaired, and knowing it is ap-  
pointed for me to die, do make and ordain this  
my last will and testament: I give and  
bequeath to my son Jacob Walker a negro woman  
named Sarah, which I purchased from my sister  
Alice ~~Walker~~ <sup>Alexander</sup> in his lifetime, together with all my live  
stock, household furniture and the residue of my lega-  
cy left to me by my brother William Watson deceased  
of North District South Carolina, comprising my whole  
and entire estate that I shall die possessed of by this my  
last will and testament, devise & give to my said son  
Jacob Walker: made in Putnam County N. Carolina  
and signed with my own hand the day & year above  
written. And I further authorize & empower my  
son Jacob aforesaid to collect any monies due to  
me that may be owing at my decease and to  
act in that case in the capacity of an executor

 the whole, and in the whole jointly & severally, firmly by  
 these presents, sealed with our seals & dated the 24 day of October  
 in the year of our Lord one Thousand eight Hundred and ~~four~~  
<sup>four</sup> The condition of the above obligation is such, that if the  
 above bound J. Walker Administrator with the will annexed  
 of the goods, Chattels, and credits of Elizabeth Walker decd. do  
 make or cause to be made, a true and perfect Inventory of all  
 and singular the goods, Chattels, & credits of the said deceased  
 which have or shall come to the hands or possession or knowledge  
 of the said J. Walker or into the hands or possession of any other  
 person for him and the same do make as exhibit into the said  
 court of ~~York~~ <sup>Ordinary</sup> at such time as he shall be there unto required by  
 the said court, and the said goods, Chattels & credits do well &  
 truly administer according to Law, and make a just and  
 true account of his actings and doings; when by Law require  
 & further do well and truly pay and deliver all the legacies  
 contained & specified in the said will as far as the said goods,  
 Chattels & credits will extend and the Law require; then this  
 obligation, to be void, or else to remain in full force.
